Dame Joan Hammond

A Belated Centennial Tribute to the Australian Soprano

Presented by Gary Thalheimer

Joan Hammond, one of several singers whose international career was curtailed by World War II, during which she served as an ambulance driver in England, with occasional concerts and opera engagements. She had a contract with the Vienna State Opera to sing Butterfly and the Marschallin in 1939 when war broke out. In England, she appeared at Sadlers Wells, toured with the Carl Rosa Opera Company and sang for the troops. One of her early recordings was "O mio babbino caro", sung in English. It became a best seller and 'went gold'. She recorded many more arias in English in the 1940s; however, by the 1950's she was transferred to the HMV Red Label artist roster and made recordings in Italian, French, German and Russian. She had a wide range, from Marguerite and Mimi to such heavier roles as Aida and Turandot, and was the first English soprano to sing Tatiana in Russian at the Bolshoi. After the war, she appeared on the continent in opera and concerts. Her U.S. Debut in 1949 included concerts and performances at the New York City Opera. Her career was cut short by a heart condition in the 1960s. Among selections to be heard will be her famous Gianni Schicchi aria, "Ocean Thou Mighty Monster" from *Oberon*, Mozart, Verdi and Puccini in English, "*Dépuis le jour*" and the *Rusalka* aria that led to a production with her at Covent Garden.

Gary Thalheimer has been a record collector since 1942, and a tape recordist since March 1954. His articles and reviews go back to the Saturday Review of the 1950s, plus a monthly New Release Bulletin for Gary Thal Music for more than 20 years. Gary's first ARSC presentation was at the Rochester meeting two decades ago. His major collecting interest is historic recordings and their preservation, in furtherance of which he has made a sizable bequest to the Sonic Arts Department of CCNY to establish both a graduate program and a tenured faculty position to teach Preservation and Transfer Techniques.
